3 WAYS TO TEACH KIDS TO "THINK BEFORE YOU POST"

We all agree that it's important to think about what you want to say before you say it and to make good decisions about the delivery of your message. Kids tend to be impulsive and go along with the trends of what others are doing and saying, and it is important that they learn to recognize how hurtful this can be. A few ways parents and guardians can teach our kids about posting are below:



- 1. Stop, Think, Continue/Choose to Respond No matter what type of photo they want to send, message they've received, or comment they wish to make, it is important to teach your children to stop, think, and continue, or choose if they wish to respond. literally every time: "Is it kind? Is it necessary? Could it hurt someone? Could it give me a bad reputation? Would my parents and teachers approve?" Once kids have considered all of these questions, they should be able to respond appropriately in any situation. If there is a problem, they should bring it to an adult's attention immediately.
- 2. Understand that there is a human on the other side Just like you would think before you speak to a friend or adult in person, you must always do the same when you're online. There are real people behind that computer, gaming system, and phone screen you are looking at, and just because you are not face to face in real life with these people, doesn't mean that common courtesy rules change. While there is a difference when you are looking a person in the eye as opposed to looking at a screen, you still must adhere to positive behavior standards always, no matter what.
- 3. Always treat others how you would want to be treated When learning proper internet etiquette, you should always remember the age-old rule: Treat others how you want to be treated. Do you like to be called names? Do you like to be told you're stupid? Do you like to have your comments dismissed and ideas ignored? Do you want people to spread rumors about you? Do you like when people laugh at your mistakes? If the answer is "No," it is safe to assume that others do not like to be treated this way, either.

REMINDERS FROM THE NURSE



6th Grade Physical Examinations: The school nurse will accept a completed physical examination from up to one year prior to the first day of school this year or at any time during the sixth-grade year. A copy of the child's immunization record must be completed and turned in with the physical.

7th Grade Dental: The school nurse will accept a dental form dated from up to one year prior to the school start date or anytime during their seventh-grade year. It is a state requirement that every student in 7th grade must have a dental exam.

All physical/dental forms can be picked up in the main office or downloaded from the district website.

CLASSROOM SPOTLIGHT: MRS. HARTMAN'S 6TH GRADE SCIENCE

Mrs. Hartman's 6th grade science students have been learning about volcanic activity along tectonic plate boundaries. Students have worked to model and map a "growing" shield volcano. Once their model was completed, they had the opportunity to investigate and interpret the eruption history of another group's volcano using techniques employed by geologists, like core sampling.
